The Evening's Program:

The Battle of Stones River

Presented by Jim Lewis National Park Service Stones River National Battlefield

As 1862 drew to a close, President Abraham Lincoln was desperate for a military victory. His armies were stalled, and the terrible defeat at Fredericksburg spread a pall of defeat across the nation. There was also the Emancipation Proclamation to consider. The nation needed a victory to bolster morale and support the proclamation when it went into effect on January 1, 1863.



The Confederate Army of Tennessee was camped in Murfreesboro, Tennessee only 30 miles away from General William S. Rosecrans' army in Nashville. General Braxton Bragg chose this area in order to position himself to stop any Union advances towards Chattanooga and to protect the rich farms of Middle Tennessee that were feeding his men. On December 26, 1863, the Union Army of the Cumberland left Nashville to meet the Confederates. This was the beginning of the Stones River Campaign. A fierce battle took place at Stones River between December 31, 1862 and January 2, 1863. Bragg's Confederates withdrew after the battle, allowing Rosecrans and the Union army to control middle Tennessee. Although the battle was tactically indecisive, it provided a much-needed boost to the North after the defeat at Fredericksburg. Lincoln later wrote to Rosecrans, "you gave us a hard-earned victory which, had there been a defeat instead, the nation could scarcely have lived over." The battle at Stones River claimed more than 23,500 casualties making it one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War.

ABOUT OUR SPEAKER: Jim Lewis has served as a Park Ranger with Stones River National Battlefield for the last seven years. He is a twelve-year veteran of the National Park Service, with previous assignments at Morristown National Historic Park and Edison National Historic Site. He is a graduate of Cornell University, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in History. During the program, Jim will tell the story of the Battle of Stones River by weaving together the individual stories of several soldiers. He hopes the audience will gain an understanding of the battle while appreciating the compelling human drama of one of the bloodiest engagements of the War.

From the Bookshelf

No Flood of Books on Stones River



This month's ICWRT program on the Battle of Stones River is an opportunity to learn more about an important engagement of the Civil War that has largely been ignored by the campaign chroniclers. Stones River has been the subject of only four book-length studies since the War, "two of which," notes a contemporary authority on the battle, "were written by Northern eyewitnesses so decidedly partisan as to make their works of little value."

For those in search of an in-depth study or simply a decent primer on the battle in advance of our September meeting, here are a few suggested works that should be available at the library or bookstore, if they are not already on your bookshelf:

The most recent and best full-length treatment of Stones River is Peter Cozzens' **NO BETTER PLACE TO DIE: THE BATTLE OF STONES RIVER** (Univ. of Illinois Press 1990). A well-documented study of the campaign as well as the battle itself, Cozzens' book, at just 281 pages, is an easy and enjoyable read for any CW buff looking for something more than what is typically found in the broader-scope general histories.

If you are fortunate to own the 28-volume illustrated history "The Civil War" published by Time-Life Books (the "silverback" series), you will want to take another look through **THE STRUGGLE FOR TENNESSEE: TUPELO TO STONES RIVER** by James Street Jr., et al. (Time-Life Books 1985). The editors of Time-Life have a knack for combining concise, authoritative narrative with outstanding reproductions of period photographs and illustrations, many in color.

Those who enjoy accounts written by partisan participants will find material of interest in the venerable **BATTLES AND LEADERS OF THE CIVIL WAR** (The Century Co. 1884 and reprints). Volume III includes articles by Col. David Urquhart, a member of Bragg's staff ("Bragg's Advance and Retreat," pp. 600-609) and Lt. Col. G.C. Kniffin, of General Crittenden's staff ("The Battle of Stone's River," pp. 613-632) as well as Crittenden himself ("The Union Left at Stone's River," pp. 632-634).

Both BATTLES AND LEADERS and Cozzens' book contain detailed summaries of the opposing forces in the battle, each compiled from the Official Records. Cozzens, by the way, is the editor of two new compilations of period accounts that have been appended to the BATTLES AND LEADERS series as Volume 5 (2002) and Volume 6 (2004), both published by the University of Illinois Press.


