The Plan of the Day Lew Wallace's Civil War Career



At various times in his remarkable life, Lew Wallace of Indiana was a lawyer, a state senator, vice president of the court-martial that tried the conspirators behind the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln, governor of the New Mexico Territory during the days of outlaw Billy the Kid, best-selling author, and a diplomat who represented the United States in Turkey. Ray E. Boomhower, the author of the Wallace biography The Sword & the Pen: A Life of Lew Wallace, will examine Wallace's turbulent career as a Civil War officer in his talk "Remember Buena Vista! Lew Wallace in the Civil War." Boomhower will track Wallace as he advances from colonel of the Eleventh Indiana to promotion to major general and subsequent downfall following the Battle of Shiloh. He will also talk about Wallace's defense of Cincinnati from Confederate attack and the resurrection of his military career as commander of the Middle Department and role in saving Washington, D.C., from Confederate attack at the Battle of Monocacy. Wallace dreamed always of glory and lived a life full of adventures, triumphs, and tragedies. Through it all, he believed in himself and was never afraid to accept new challenges. He remains one of the most colorful and important figures in the Hoosier State's history.

Ray Boomhower is interim senior director of the Indiana Historical Society Press, where he also is editor of the IHS's popular history magazine *Traces of Indiana and Midwestern History*. In addition to his Wallace biography, Boomhower has written books on such notable Hoosiers as Gus Grissom, Ernie Pyle, May Wright Sewall, and John Bartlow Martin. He is currently writing a book for Indiana University Press on World War II correspondent Robert L. Sherrod, who covered the Pacific war for *Time* magazine.

Special Orders

Virginia Historical Society: The Virginia Historical Society has partnered with the American Civil War Museum to transfer the research collection from the Museum of the Confederacy to the VHS where it will be digitized and catalogued. This new Civil War Research Center at the Virginia Historical Society will be the largest independent repository of Civil War research materials in the world.

Memphis Parks Update: Lawyers for the City of Memphis and Sons of Confederate Veterans Nathan Bedford Forrest Camp # 215 returned to court in December to determine whether the Memphis City Council resolution (Feb. 5, 2013) to rename three parks was valid. Forrest Park, near the University of Tennessee Health Science Center, became Health Sciences Park. Confederate Park, near Court Avenue and North Front Street, became Memphis Park. Jefferson Davis Park, at Riverside Drive and Court Avenue, became Mississippi River Park. The day before their resolution, the state legislature had introduced a bill making it illegal to rename historical statues, monuments, buildings, and parks located on public property.

Auction: Allan Arkush has donated a framed picture by Dale Gallon of the thirty-seven members of the Seventy-second Indiana Infantry Company A guarding the bridge at Chickamauga Creek. They were supported by Eli Lilly's Eighteenth Battery, who are pictured in the background. They held off Walker's Division and prevented them from crossing at the bridge. Wilder's Lightning Brigade had two regiments from Indiana; one of those was the Seventy-second Infantry from Lafayette, Indiana. Wilder was from Greensburg, Indiana and supplied the entire brigade, including two Illinois regiments, with Spencer seven-shot repeating rifles. The artillery battery was led by Col. Eli Lilly, making this print an interest for any Hoosier collector. All proceeds from the auction will go to the Indianapolis Civil War Round Table. Starting bid for this auction is \$100. There is a reserve that must be met for the picture. The auction will continue until the June banquet and the picture will go to the winner that night. Lew kept the gun from a dead Confederate after the Battle of Fort Donelson.




