The Plan of the Day Census in the Civil War



Photo from https://www.census.gov/history/www/sights_sounds/photos/1870_photos.php Our speaker will present how the Census played a part during the Civil War. Two Superintendents of the Census, Joseph C.G. Kennedy and Francis Amasa Walker (1850, 1860, 1870, and 1880 respectively) both oversaw the Decennial Census(es) are featured. Joseph Kennedy was known for his tireless efforts of showing statistical economic information for the Union cause. This information was proven to be invaluable to General William Sherman in his infamous 'March to the Sea' campaign in 1864. Also, the rise of the future Census Superintendent Francis Walker (1870 & 1880) will be featured as he rose through the ranks to be a General by the age of 25 at the end of the war. Finally, the 12th Illinois Cavalry will be discussed for their exploits during the Civil War and the use of Census data, but a new topic to the Roundtable will show not all troops were allowed to go home when the war ended. The 12th Illinois played a key part in the Battle of Antietam in 1862, but just as important was what they did from May of 1865 to June of 1866 because they didn't muster out.

Book Review by Nikki Schofield: *A Rebel in Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg* by John H. Lewis was published in 1895 and is available in print from Big Byte Books on Amazon. The book of 58 pages tells more than the event of July 3, 1863. Lieutenant Lewis begins his story in the spring of 1860 in Savannah, Georgia, and tells of his army career, including imprisonment, through June 1865. The editors have added some valuable notes. Mr. Lewis is a good writer. This book is well worth reading.


CENSUS OF 1860. - As the productions of the year about to close form a large proportion of the elements of agricultural returns to be embodied in the coming census, it is suggested that more than ordinary care be taken by our people in preserving an accurate account of their various products of the field; for, although the census year embraces the period between the first day of June, 1859, and the first day of June, 1860, including the latter, the amount of agricultural products is mainly determined the present winter, and unless some care is exercised the producer is not likely to be prepared to make a proper return upon the sudden and unexpected call of the census agent in the summer. - In fact, it would be well if every farmer and planter would have and hold in view the importance of being fully prepared with a statement wherefrom the questions of the marshals could be promptly and correctly answered. The reason which should induce preparation now on the part of the agricultural community are, at a later period, equally applicable to all classes of persons. It is a gratifying fact, and one creditable to the intelligence of the American people, that in taking the seventh census only three persons demurred to responding to the questions of the marshals, and they waved their objections when appealed to by the officer having the general charge of that work.

We understand that timely notice will be given regarding the nature of the information required for the eighth census, which we hope the public press will liberally aid in spreading throughout the land, and it is not for a moment to be doubted that our people, who are to reap the benefit of the knowledge gained, will manifest an universal and cheerful alacrity in contributing each their quota of the facts, which, in the aggregate, go to illustrate the condition and progress of the nation.

The Highland Weekly News (Hillsboro, Ohio) Thursday, January 13, 1870, page 2 The Next Census.

In the bill prepared by the Census Committee, the schedules presented are: 1, Population; 2, Mortality; 3, Agriculture; 4, Manufactures, to which is added Mining; 5, Mercantile, under which each merchant must return the amount of purchases and sales, the number of person employed, and the capital invested; 6, Social; under this in addition to schools and churches, is included all reformatory and benevolent institutions; 7, Transportation, to include full returns from all public carriers of the whole business done in passengers and freights, the number of employees, profits, expenses and incidents; 8, Fisheries. Each of the old schedules has been so extended as to cover a far greater ground than in the last census, while 5, 7, and 8 are wholly new.



Officer of the Month

Francis Amasa Walker was born July 2, 1840 in Boston, Massachusetts. He became a brevetted Brigadier General at the age of 24 during the Civil War. After the war, he served as superintendent of the 1870 Census, president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, president of the American Statistical Association, the first president of the American Economic Association, economics professor at Yale, and head of the statistical bureau of the U.S. Treasury. He died January 5, 1897 and lies buried in Walnut Grove Cemetery in North Brookfield, Massachusetts.
