





Having served in nuclear submarines during the 1970s, Gary Johnson wondered what life was like one hundred years earlier in the Navy during the Civil War, a part of the military whose contributions are not well understood. He is a graduate of the Ohio State University in Chemical Engineering. After five years of submarine duty, he worked in Health, Safety, and Environment for Procter & Gamble and his consulting clients. Retiring from consulting, he and his wife live in Cincinnati where he is a member of the Cincinnati Civil War Round Table. The Civil War was a time of technological transition and stress for sailors and officers in the Navy and his presentations focus on how those men had to live and learn the technology and its changes in their daily lives.

AFTER ACTION REPORT From April 8, 2019 ICWRT Meeting: Because our scheduled speaker had to cancel, the members served as speakers on the topic of whether Confederate monuments should be removed. The discussion was lively. John Gilmore said that removing monuments "robs kids of history." Wes Hanson said, "Leave them be." Ted Commons said that "removal will not serve any purpose." Peg Bertelli said, "Removing statues is fostering willful ignorance." Martha McDonald said to recognize the people but "publicly say this is wrong." Bill Ghormley, a guide at Conner Prairie, said they tell the story of Morgan's Raid and have a program entitled "Follow the North Star" in which participants are treated like runaway slaves. Revisionist history was discussed. Members were in agreement that young people do not learn history in school. The group also agreed that Confederate monuments should not be removed.

BOOK REVIEW By Nikki Stoddard Schofield: *The Battle of Gettysburg* by Frank Aretas Haskell (1828-1864) was privately printed in 1878. Frank compiled the book as a letter to his brother, H. M. Haskell, who published it 14 years after Frank's death at the Battle of Cold Harbor. In his report on Cold Harbor, General Hancock called First Lieutenant F. A. Haskell, who was aide-de-camp to General Gibbon, "a gallant young officer." This book is an eye-witness account of the Battle of Gettysburg and is easy reading, since it was originally a family letter. His description of Dan Sickles advancing without orders is especially interesting. I checked Amazon to see if it is still in print. The Kindle version is free. There are several editions, including an annotated volume. I highly recommend this book.

The Philadelphia Inquirer (Philadelphia, Pennsylvania) Wednesday, March 12, 1862, page 4

Iron-Clad Vessels.

It has now been made clear to all the world that the day of the old lumbering frigates has passed by. The fierce struggle in Hampton Roads on Saturday, and the terrible duel of the *Merrimac* and the *Monitor* on Sunday, have taught a practical lesson which no maritime power can afford to overlook. It was not merely the struggle of Loyalists and Rebels; it was a conflict of the old with the new and the new has won the day. It will stand out in bold relief in the history of naval warfare as one of the signal battles of the world.

The French and the English have theorized; we have advanced to practical tests. The hybrid, wooden and iron monster, *La Gloire*, has been a failure; the iron leviathan, *The Warrior*, has not fulfilled the promises made for it. But the *Merrimac* has won a large renown; the *Monitor* has been a perfect success. So far as harbor defence is concerned, the *Monitor* leaves but little to be desired. No iron-clad vessel that cannot stand the fierce tossings and angry wrenches of a stormy ocean can be expected to compete with her. Our defence from invasion by the seaboard may, therefore, be made perfect. That may be regarded as a point fully settles. The cost of the experiment we can well afford in view of the results to which it has led.

But there is still an unsolved problem. France and England have attempted the solution, but have not succeeded. They will doubtless try and try again. In the meantime our skill and ingenuity can find no more fitting exercise than in experiments in the same direction. The problem may be briefly stated as follows: - How to secure - 1. Perfect impregnability, as in the case of the *Monitor*; 2. Perfect seaworthiness, so that the vessel will remain staunch and tight amid all the straining and wrenching of ocean service; 3. The greatest possible power - for this will come to be an essential element of success - it was this that drove the ploughshare of the *Merrimac* crashing into the ribs of the *Cumberland*; 4. The smallest possible draft of water.

These are the main features of the problem that is yet to be solved. It must now be solved speedily. Again we invite, as we have done before, the attention of our scientific men to this subject. Captain ERICSSON has set a noble and successful example, but there are laurels yet to be won. He who produces the most formidable, manageable and invulnerable ship will merit the everlasting gratitude of his country.

Detroit Free Press (Detroit, Michigan) Wednesday, January 1, 1862, page 1 REBEL TORPEDOES IN THE MISSISSIPPI. - The correspondent of the St. Louis *Republican* under date of December 22, says:

A deserter who came within the lines at Fort Holt to-day states that there are fifty thousand men at Columbus, and this has been so often affirmed lately that there is little

doubt it is true. He also stated that the river is full of torpedoes, and this I think to be partly so from the fact that the Grampus while approaching us to-day made a remarkably zig-zag cruise, turning abruptly and often while passing through Lucas bend.

It is to be hoped that General Halleck will not under-estimate his foe in this case, or believe the stories that they are few in number and ill-defended at Columbus. On the contrary, rebel ingenuity has been expended for months, strengthening that point, which is really the key to the whole southern portion of the river. If Columbus is taken the other fortifications lower down will easily fall, and government should only make the attack with an overwhelming force.

Civilian of the Month

Photo and information from Find A Grave memorial # 2137 **Stephen Russell Mallory** was born in 1812. He fought in the Second Seminole War (1835 - 1842), served in the U.S. Senate (1851 - 1861; and as Confederate Secretary of the Navy. He was captured in La Grange, Georgia in April 1865 and held as prisoner for almost a year. After the war, he practiced law. He died November 9, 1873 and lies buried in Saint Michael's Cemetery in Pensacola, Florida.



National Civil War Naval Museum, 1002 Victory Drive, Columbus, Georgia: This is the only museum that tells the story of both the Confederate and Union navies during the Civil War. It houses the largest surviving Confederate warship, the CSS *Jackson*, the wreckage of the CSS *Chattahoochee*, and replicas of the USS *Water Witch*, the USS *Hartford*, and the USS *Monitor* turret. It has the largest collection of Civil War Naval-related flags and a timeline exhibit taking visitors month by month through the war. It is open Monday - Saturday 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sunday 12:30 - 4:30 p.m., closed on New Year's, Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Admission is \$7.50 for adults, \$6.50 for military/seniors, \$6.00 for students, and free for children 6 and under. Group tours are also available.
