The Plan of the Day



photo from https://www.archives.gov/education/lessons/atlanta-campaign.html "THE QUESTION WAS ONE OF SUPPLIES" - THE LOGISTICS FOR WILLIAM T. SHERMAN'S ATLANTA CAMPAIGN - No army in history moved without a secure line of supplies especially if it moved into enemy territory. If an army got cut off from its supplies then calamity usually followed often ending in defeat and/or destruction. When William T. Sherman set his sights on Atlanta, he prepared for the supplying of his army in a manner that surpassed every other Civil War general. Rebuilding railroads and confiscating locomotives and cars to haul supplies, Sherman set a daily goal for shipments to his forward base in Chattanooga. Ruthless in making sure that only supplies got on the cars, Sherman also had to worry about protecting the line of rails that ran back to Louisville, Kentucky from Confederate raiders. Building on a system begun by William S. Rosecrans, Sherman's engineers built forts and blockhouses and prepared pre-fabricated trestles for replacing those brought down by Confederate raiders. While his preparations were masterful and thorough, they were not without some flaws. This program will examine the nuts and bolts of these logistics and cover the errors that were also made. In the end, his supply line performed as expected and Atlanta was captured. This set the stage for two more campaigns that Sherman would undertake before the war ended in April 1865 as well as logistics for more modern wars. There is a power point for this program.

New York Daily Herald (New York, New York) 06 Sept 1864, Tuesday, page 4 NATIONAL THANKS TO GENERAL SHERMAN AND HIS ARMY. Executive Mansion, Sept. 3, 1864.

The national thanks are tendered by the President to Major General William T. Sherman and the gallant officers and soldiers of his command before Atlanta, for the distinguished ability, courage and perseverance displayed in the campaign in Georgia, which, under Divine power, resulted in the capture of the city of Atlanta.

The marches, battles, sieges and other military operations that have signalized this campaign must render it famous in the annals of war, and have entitled those who participated therein to the applause and thanks of the nation. ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

William T. Sherman was born February 8, 1820 in Lancaster, Ohio. He graduated from West Point sixth in his class at the age of sixteen. He served in the Army, attempted careers in banking and law, and became the first president of Louisiana Military Seminary (Louisiana State University). He rejoined the Army with the start of the Civil War. "Everlasting fame was his during the Georgia campaign and his 'March to the Sea." He continued to serve in the Army until his retirement in 1884, overseeing the completion of the transcontinental railroad, orchestrating the defeat of the Plains Indian tribes, and establishing the Ft. Leavenworth Command School. He died February 14, 1891 and lies buried in Section 17 of Calvary Cemetery and Mausoleum in Saint Louis, Missouri.
