"Gettysburg After 50 Years – The Great Reunion"

Gettysburg After 50 Years – The Great Reunion will examine how the former combatants experienced and enjoyed this colossal event, and the memories they took home. With over 53,000 attendees it was the largest reunion of Civil War veterans ever held. The presentation is replete with period photographs and interesting anecdotal details.

Included in the presentation will be an introduction to fourteen members of Mr. Jackson's family who participated in the Battle of Gettysburg. One of them was awarded the Medal of Honor, earned during Picket's Charge. His deed of valor eventually involved a former WWF professional wrestler.

Steve Jackson

A life-long resident of Anderson, Indiana, Steve Jackson is a graduate of Anderson High School and Indiana University. He was employed by the General Motors Corporation at its Guide Lamp Division in Anderson for over 38 years.

Steve has been the Madison County Historian since 2008, and has a series of four books chronicling the history of Madison County. A fifth book is scheduled for publication in the fall of 2023.

A past president of the Indianapolis Civil War Round Table, having served during the 1999 campaign, Steve has also served as a camp commander and department commander of the Indiana Department, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, held memberships in several hereditary organizations, and currently serves as a member of the board of trustees for Anderson's Maplewood Cemetery, acting as historical consultant.

This Month in Civil War Era History

June 9, 1860 – "Malaseka, The Indian Wife of the White Hunter," by Ann Stevens, became the first U.S. "dime novel" to be published.

June 8, 1861, Tennessee became the final of the eleven states to secede from the Union.

June 14, 1863 - Lt. Gen. Richard S. Ewell defeated Maj. Gen. Robert H. Milroy at the Second Battle of Winchester, Virginia, paving the way for the Army of Northern Virginia's invasion of Pennsylvania.

My Memorial Pilgrimage

It had long been my goal to see the final resting place of Asa Hoyt, my great, great grandfather's older brother. Of the many ancestors I have that served in the War of Rebellion, he was the only one to die as a direct result of combat. Another's health was ruined after two years on the South Carolina coast.

As and his older brother David first enlisted at Wapakoneta, Ohio in the 15th Ohio (3-month) a few days after Ft. Sumter. They saw little action and a lot of western Virginia in this tour of service. When the 15th mustered out in late August 1861, David went home to his wife and child (*he would later reenlist in the 10th Ohio Cavalry*) and Asa immediately enlisted in Co. F, 64th O.V.I.

Asa Hoyt would go on to see service at the Siege of Corinth, in the Kentucky Campaign, at Stones River, Chickamauga, and on Missionary Ridge. He turned 22 in April 1864, only a few weeks before William T. Sherman launched his Atlanta Campaign.

On May 8, 1864 the 340 men the 64th Ohio moved into a position on Rocky Face Ridge just north of Confederate Brig. General Edmund Pettus' Alabama brigade. Lt. Col. R. C. Brown would write in September 1864 "the following day the brigade closed en masse, this regiment in advance, (and) charged the enemy's works on the crest of the ridge, which proved disastrous to our forces, and especially my regiment." The 64th lost 21 killed and 52 wounded. Col. Alexander McIlvain was among the dead, killed attempting to rescue a wounded soldier. Asa Hoyt was carried from the field and sent to a hospital in Chattanooga, where he died on May 14th, 1864. He is buried in the national cemetery there.



His death may have contributed to my great, great grandfather running away at age 15 to enlist in the 187th Ohio Infantry.

This past week I made the journey to find Asa Hoyt's grave at the Chattanooga National Cemetery, and, as close as I could, to where he received his death wound. Though his name was badly misspelled on his headstone, his grave was easy enough to find.

The trek up Rocky Face Ridge was another matter, and almost didn't happen. Initially I'd hoped to make this trip a week earlier, but the weather hadn't cooperated. And although all sources promised clear skies, I awoke to clouds and wet ground on the morning I intended to make the 771foot ascent to the top. I knew if the climb didn't happen that day, it wasn't likely to ever happen, so I risked it and pushed ahead.

Fortunately, the rain had ceased and the skies cleared. Even without mud, the footslog to the top was pretty intimidating. The park here is still relatively new, and trail maps are scanty after a point. But in spite of the cuts and bruises, and the risk of snakebite and a potential poison rash, I pushed on and eventually found my way to the top of the ridge. I'd like to be able to say that I found the spot where Asa Hoyt fell, but unfortunately there is more than enough vegetation along the narrow peak of the ridge to preclude an absolute fix on a location. I can say I feel as though I accomplished my mission.

In addition to these sites, I made it a point to see Chickamauga, Ringgold, Resaca, Pickett's Mill, Big Shanty, and Kennesaw Mountain. It had been 40 years since I last made this trip, and much had changed.
